



Our New President Shares House Corporation Updates

Brothers,

I am honored to have been elected president and treasurer of the house corporation. I have big shoes to fill given Bill Beach's ('69) nearly 40 years of leadership; it goes without saying that such a long period of service is simply incredible. I am hopeful that Bill will continue to offer his considerable experience to the deliberations of the board as we move forward. As much as he has earned the right to rest on his laurels given all that he accomplished, organizations of all types benefit from the input of their past presidents, and I trust this one will be no different. Bill, thank you for your dedicated years of service—we would not be here today without your many years of leadership.

One of the most important goals I have—especially given the loss of the charter in 1998 and its subsequent reinstatement on February 17, 2008—is to close the decade

of “generation gap” in alumni involvement. Most of the board members are of the late 1970s and early 1980s era, and we need to strive for involvement from more Sigs who live in Central New York and alumni from recent graduating classes. We will celebrate the fifth anniversary of the rechartering in February 2013. This would be a great opportunity to use one of our traditions—the Clambake—to celebrate the return of large numbers of recent graduates.

In the near term, I will focus on updating our approach to business administration to reduce the burden of “bookkeeping” on the house corporation leadership—a truly thankless task that can be outsourced. We also need to bring alumni relations into the social networking era—although some of us may not use Facebook, our more contemporary alumni and undergraduates certainly do. I set up a Facebook group “Psi Psi Chapter of Sigma Chi Fraternity (Syracuse University)” to

move in that direction. Postings to date range from humorous to highly complimentary about the state of the house. In time, with support from the undergraduates, we will overhaul our website to enhance our bulk email capabilities, alumni database administration, and “push” calendar notifications for upcoming events to improve alumni outreach. While the chapter house is in excellent condition and so far, is the only Greek house to pass City of Syracuse fire inspection on the first attempt—we will undertake a long-term capital requirement assessment to ensure we develop the financial resources to maintain its condition. This way, we can continue to serve the needs of the undergraduates for housing, board club, and social events. After all, it's a fraternity house that we have to maintain to overcome the pounding it takes in the ordinary course of its existence. We will complete the capital campaign, under-

Bill Beach '69 is a Brother With a Deep Sense of Personal Responsibility

This letter for the *Saltine Sig* is to commemorate the accomplishments of one of our own, who, for more than 40 years, has taken it upon himself to ensure that the legacy of the Psi Psi Chapter of Sigma Chi at Syracuse University continues in perpetuity; that man is Bill Beach '69.

Bill Beach was one of the undergraduate brothers who was intimately involved in moving Psi Psi from its former location to 737 Comstock Avenue. After the acquisition of the property, which included recovering money from the Colgate Chapter when it acquired its property, Bill has been actively involved in managing the property and mentoring generations of Psi Psi brothers. In fact, Bill has served on the house corporation in one form or another since graduation—an accomplishment I think we can all agree is above and beyond the call of duty.

Bill Beach has devoted his life to ensuring that the undergraduate brothers of the Psi Psi Chapter have always possessed a

home to call their own. His selfless efforts to secure, maintain, operate, and protect our home during the past 40 years are absolutely heroic. As a Psi Psi since 1974, I know of no other brother who has stayed actively involved for this amount of time. Bill Beach personifies everything good that Sigma Chi embodies. His leadership,

perseverance, integrity, and commitment is why he is so respected as someone who takes his responsibilities very seriously, and why he is such a strong role model for the undergraduate chapter.

I am also convinced that had it not been for Bill Beach, the chance of Psi Psi returning to Syracuse University would be very slim. The mere fact that we owned the house with no debt was a major factor in the university administration and Sigma Chi Headquarters moving our return to SU forward so quickly. Once Psi Psi was an official chapter of Sigma Chi, Bill immediately turned his attention to the renovation of the property to provide a safe, clean, and beautiful living environment for our undergraduates to succeed in their academic and social efforts on campus.

As an undergraduate, I have interacted with Bill several times and the house corporation, and although I didn't always agree with some of their decisions, I was treated
